The largest on record is 236 lbs. and is housed at Brookfield Zoo in Chicago, Illinois. This turtle has a worm-shaped appendage on the tip of its tongue that imitates the movements of a worm, luring fish to its waiting open mouth.

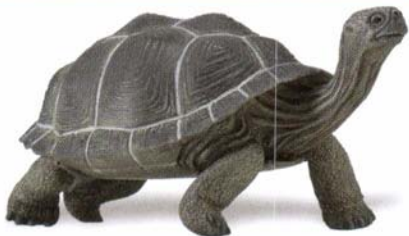

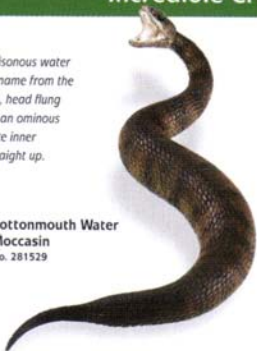
This tree-dweller can change the color of its body depending on the temperature, the food it eats and its mood.
